Eviction - Possessions still in apartment





We were evicted last week. I thought the landlord had to let us get our belongings that we left behind for a minimum of 24 hours, but they were not. I looked in the windows and everything is still there. What can I do?

Hi lessie.

First, you should send your landlord a letter to set up a time to pick up your belongings. If the landlord does not respond, then you should file a small claims case against him to get your items back. Of, if he sold them, for the value of the items.
